

The Work of the SOPA District Board

Comments from your District Board Chair

Who is serving on the SOPA District Board and what does the board really do anyway? Have you ever been curious enough to ponder that question? Just in case you have, let me attempt to answer that question. I will begin by sharing the Mission and Vision statements of our District and describing the basic structure of the board and its members.

The Southern Pennsylvania District Mission is:

Create New Testament communities committed to personal transformation thru Jesus Christ.

The Southern Pennsylvania District Vision Statement is:

Working together to empower disciples for ministry and mission through: Leadership Development, Mission and Service opportunities, and Creative Resourcing.

A brief sketch of the ongoing work of the board is to provide leadership in district ministries: such as working in cooperation with the District Executive, credentialing and supporting pastors, overseeing district finances, working with outreach ministries such as disaster relief, meat canning, foreign missions, youth, women's, and men's, and park chaplaincy ministries, etc. Supporting and cooperating with our affiliated organizations such as Camp Eder, Children's Aid Society, Brethren Home, etc. These are some of the ways we are working for you.

Please be in prayer for your district board as we face several monumental tasks. We are exploring new direction in the configuration of district staffing and organization of our district.

With the current uncertainties within the Church of the Brethren denomination and our district going from 44 to 27 churches in the past few years, we must make adaptations that match our size and better serve our mission.

I am very pleased with the leadership of our interim district executive, Georgia Markey, but the fact that she is "interim" means that we are still working at finding a long-term arrangement for this position. We have already moved the District Executive position from full-time to part-time during the interim period. Some other districts have moved to a team approach, which is one of the options we are seriously exploring. We are blessed to welcome Linette Quinn as our new administrative assistant. Moving forward we will likely need to adjust the responsibilities of that staff position in order to properly fit a new executive configuration which is still in process. Another factor that possibly needs consideration is the evaluation of the current location of the district office and how that affects the total search process. These are some of the intricately intertwined variables your executive committee and district board must prayerfully consider. Lots of wisdom and Holy Spirit guidance is a necessity as we move forward. Keep praying!

Having fewer congregations in the district prompts the need to restructure the zones and the representation on the district board from those zones. There is consideration of recommending combining some responsibilities of commissions and reducing the number of commissions from five to four as well as reducing the number of members needed in some commissions. This would reduce the number of board members from 26 to 19. If approved by the district board, this recommendation would require an amendment to the district constitution and therefore require approval by the delegates of the next District Conference.

Obviously, we are in a time of transition and challenge for our beloved SOPA District. We thank you for your prayers and kind patience as we continue the work of Christ's Kingdom.

2024 Disaster Relief Auction Report

The 46th Brethren Disaster Relief Auction was held on September 22 & 23, 2023, at the Lebanon Expo Center.

Some of the significant income was generated by, Food Sales-\$33,942, Heifer Auction-\$76,247, Theme Baskets-\$14,755, Quilts-\$31,945, Coin Auction-\$9,270, General Auction-\$30,355. Overall gross proceeds were approximately \$416,367, (including estate bequests), leaving \$405,000 for distribution.

Distributions made: \$385,000 to Brethren Disaster Ministries and \$20,000 to ANE for Disaster Relief Trips. As always, we appreciate all the support we receive from the Churches in the Atlantic Northeast and Southern PA Districts and our many other supporters that have made the Brethren Disaster Relief Auction a success for 46 years. We are an all-volunteer auction and any help you can provide to set-up the auction and to help on the auction days is welcome. Deepest sympathy to the family of Belita Mitchell, retired pastor and the denomination's first Black female moderator, passed away on Saturday, February 10, 2024, at her home in Mechanicsburg, Pennsylvania.

The first African-American woman to be ordained in the Church of the Brethren, Sister Belita was called as the 2007 Annual Conference Moderator. She served as pastor to Church of the Brethren congregations at Imperial Heights (Calif.) and Harrisburg First (Pa.). Along with her husband, Don, she was recognized in 2017 by the denomination's Intercultural Ministries as a significant leader in efforts to make the Church of the Brethren an intercultural church, and in 2022 she was the preacher for the final worship service at Annual Conference in Omaha and also was a past guest speaker at So PA District's District Conference.



What does it mean to lead in today's church and world? The American protestant church is in steep decline. The Church of the Brethren is experiencing schism. The pandemic accelerated the already changing patterns of religious life. Resources are scarce. Furthermore, Brethren are naturally suspicious of leaders; called, elected, or self-proclaimed. Values, such as humility, consensus, and the priesthood of all believers, lead to a flat hierarchy and a communal pragmatism. We celebrate leaders such as Dan West, Sarah Major, M.R. Zigler, and Anna Mow, but in their day, they stirred controversy by the manner of their leading. So, what does it mean to lead in today's church and world? I believe leadership begins by asking the first question and having the willingness and curiosity to pursue the second question. It is a way of thinking that results in effective doing. And yes, it is something we do together.

A Ministry Sponsored by the District's Nurture Commission, via the PA Council of Churches








Listening for the Sound of the Genuine


July 2-3, 2024 Grand Rapids, Michigan

FRANK A. THOMAS, PHD, serves as the Director of the new Compelling Preaching Initiative and the Nettie Sweeney and Hugh Th. Miller Professor of Homiletics at Christian Theological Seminary, Indianapolis, Indiana. He has previously taught at McCormick Theological Seminary in Chicago; Memphis Theological Seminary in Tennessee; and United Theological Seminary of Dayton, Ohio. He is the CEO of Hope For Life International, Inc., which formerly published *The African American Pulpit*.

Thomas has served as senior pastor for congregations in Matteson, Illinois and Memphis, Tennessee. Out of a lifetime practicing, studying, teaching, and writing about preaching, Dr. Thomas invites us to "Listen for the sound of the genuine."

Howard Thurman writes "There is something in every [one of us] that waits, listens for the sound of the genuine in [ourselves]." Preaching is a reflection of the genuine inside of ourselves. But, have we ever listened to our own preaching? We concentrate on what our preaching says to the congregation or the audience, but what does it say to us when we actually sit down and listen carefully, quietly, and deeply to our own sermons? Do we hear the sound of the genuine? Preachers would be helped to cultivate the discipline of listening to the sound that comes through their sermons. Each preacher is a better preacher when they are able to answer the question: How does the sound of the genuine come through you, particularly through preaching?

His books The Choice: Living Your Passion Inside Out and Preaching as Celebration Digital Lecture Series (based on his first book, They Like to Never Quit Praisin' God) will be the basis of our event. His most recently book is The God of the Dangerous Sermon.

Living in 'The Land of Eternal Spring'

Many stereotypes exist in the minds of Americans and other Westerners about the climate of the African continent. It is a commonly held belief that Africa is either a sweltering, steamy jungle or a parched, barren, desert land, complete with the sight of camels strutting on the far horizon.

But northwestern Rwanda fits neither of these. While it is located just one degree south of the equator, northwest Rwanda sits at an elevation of anywhere from 5,000 to 10,000 feet above sea level, with a few mountaintops more than 14,000 feet. As an equatorial highland climate, it averages a daily high of 75 degrees Fahrenheit

and dips into the 60's at night year-round. There is a consistent dawn to dusk from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. throughout the year.

Four seasons plan out the lives of a mostly agrarian society: long rainy season, long dry season, followed by a short rainy season and a short dry season. Being able to eat locally grown fresh fruit and vegetables during the time of winter in the US, or going swimming in the lake in January seems strange, but it's not hard to get accustomed to!

Rwanda bears the nicknames "The Land of a Thousand Hills" and "The Land of Eternal Spring." With lush green mountains and fields of tea and banana plantations stretching as far as the eye can see, it is so beautiful that it can only be appreciated when one sees it with their own eyes.

This is Rwanda, a land of great contrast. There is poverty, but there is hope. There is sadness in the shadow of war in the past and on the horizon in the hills of Congo, but there is peace in surrender to King Jesus, the one who sets his people free. It is the Land of a Thousand Hills, and the land of a thousand smiles and laughs. The children cheerfully chasing each other around attired in worn footie pajamas or tattered ballerina outfits prove the resilience of the young. Life is hard, hunger is a constant companion, war looms on the horizon, in a fight for survival.

But there is joy in the blessing of another day, thankfulness in eating food today, and the peace of a life surrendered to Christ, the satisfaction of the filling of the Holy Spirit. This is Rwanda. This is my home. My growth as a person in the past year has been exponential. Africa has produced many strong women. I am one of them. I am a daughter of the Land of Eternal Spring. *Imana ishimwe* (To God be the glory)!

In the Shadow

Shalom

halom is a beautiful name for a Church of the Brethren congregation. With leadership from Pastor Hezekiah, Shalom is located in one of the surrounding communities of Uganda's sprawling capital city of Kampala. The metropolitan area is estimated at nearly 7 million people and is among the fastest growing cities in Africa. To say that it is sprawling is no exaggeration. Even with some recent road construction, it can take hours to get across town.

I first visited the church about two years ago, shortly after they had purchased a small plot

of land and erected a simple structure. There was no roof, just a wooden frame with a few tarps tacked to the sides to keep the wind from blowing through. It had rained the night before, making for a very muddy worship experience.

Two years later, that is all changed. There is now metal roofing and siding, a cement floor and a tiled stage area. The simple, but contemporary decorating of the stage

is very attractive. It is painted black with a cutout version of the COB logo (yes, it is backwards), some string art and colored lighting to sharpen it up, all very tastefully done.

On this particular Sunday morning, the worship team led a lively and inspirational time of singing and prayer. Most of the lyrics were in the Luganda language, although a few were sung in English, making it easier for me to sing along.

The most memorable part of the service was the testimony time.

Several came to the front to share something that the Lord had done for them or a blessing for which they were especially grateful. One older sister in particular touched my heart. She was tall and thin, obviously having recently dealt with some serious health issues. It turns out that she had had brain cancer. She mentioned that doctors played a role in her healing story, but it was a very small role. It is God to whom she gives all the glory. She went on at length making it crystal clear that the Lord Jesus Christ is our healer and He is the only means by which we can be saved. It is Christ alone that gives us hope, whether earthly or heavenly. Preach it, Sister!

Great Lakes Bible School

The third term of the Great Lakes Bible School began on 5 February with students from Rwanda and Democratic Republic of Congo. We are also very blessed to have an instructor from Nigeria, Joshua Ishya Mamza. Joshua has come to us with the recommendation and support of several American Brethren and the EYN (Church of the Brethren Nigeria). His resume includes teaching at EYN's Kulp Theological Seminary and authoring several books. Joshua's musical abilities, strong biblical teaching and sunny personality make him a joy to work alongside. Courses this term include Old and New Testament Introduction, Christian Education, Principles of Preaching, General Church History, Missions and Evangelism, Brethren History, Christian Worship, Systematic Theology, and Advanced English.

Vocational education

Pastors in these parts are rarely full time, in most cases receiving no salary at all. Occasionally some will receive a portion of the offerings. Practical vocational skills are absolutely essential. Most possess at least rudimentary farming/gardening skills and have experience with basic construction; therefore, among our goals for the students is that they might be better equipped

Our latest project is a flock of laying hens, pictured on the left. We have about 150, purchased as chicks. They should be providing us eggs in a few weeks. This will not only supply us with our own eggs, but allow us some income as well. Janvier, our business manager, has taken responsibility for the chickens and is coaching the students in poultry husbandry skills.

Burundi and Rwanda Schools

Continue to pray with us for God's provision as He meets the needs of our other school projects. The Brethren Academy primary construction is nearing completion, with a remaining need of about \$2,500.

Grace is now halfway through her second year of BVS service. Pray for her as she considers future plans.

The Burundi Brethren School is also needing, and is worthy of, your generous support.
