Free Spring Library News

The following are fiction books; some are part of a series.



Pearl River Series by Patricia Bradley

<u>Counter Attack</u> – The day Alexis Stone is sworn in as sheriff, the Queen's Gambit Killer strikes again, leaving a

calling card of a white pawn and a note with a chess move printed on it. Alexis must join forces with Police Chief Nathan Landry to find the killer before their next move. (This is the first book in the series.)

Cape Cod Creamery Series by Suzanne Woods Fisher

<u>The Sweet Life</u> – Dawn Dixon can hardly believe she's on a groom-less honeymoon on beautiful Cape Cod...with her mother. Sure, Marnie Dixon is good company, but Dawn was supposed to be here with Kevin, the love of her life (or so she thought). Marnie Dixon needs some time away from the absolute realness of life as much as her jilted daughter does, and she's not about to let her only child suffer alone – even if Marnie herself had been doing precisely that for the past month. (This is the first book in the series.)

Heroines of World War II Series by Patty Smith Hall

<u>On My Honor</u> – Ginny Mathis had no intention of staying rooted in the Outer Banks – then war broke out. While working as a clerk for Oregon Inlet ferry, naval officers ask her to be watchful for German U-boats reportedly spotted in the area. To help occupy her younger sister, Ginny enlists the Girl Scout troop she leads to help watch for suspicious activity. Soon the girls are sneaking around, hiding a shipwreck survivor. Ginny must take charge, but is this man the enemy, or does he hold secrets that could turn the tide of the Battle of the Atlantic in the allies' favor? (This is the eighth book in the series; the other books are <u>The Cryptographer's Dilemma</u> by Johnnie Alexander, <u>A Picture of Hope</u> by Liz Tolsma, <u>Saving Mrs. Roosevelt</u> by Candice Sue Patterson, <u>Mrs. Witherspoon Goes to War</u> by Mary Davis, <u>A Rose for Remembrance</u> by Angela K. Couch, <u>Season of My Enemy</u> by Naomi Musch, and <u>Escape from Amsterdam</u> by Lauralee Bliss.)

Colorado Cowboys Series by Jody Hedlund

<u>The Last Chance Cowboy</u> – When midwife Catherine Remington is accused of a murder she didn't commit, she flees to Colorado to honor a patient's dying wish to deliver a newborn to his father. But what she doesn't bargain for is how easily she'll fall for the charming sheriff, or how quickly her past will catch up with her and put their love and lives in danger. (This is the fifth book in the series; the other books are <u>A Cowboy for</u> Keeps, The Heart of a Cowboy, To Tame a Cowboy, and Falling for the Cowgirl.)

Pictures of the Heart Series by Tracie Peterson

<u>Remember Me</u> – Addie Bryant is haunted by her past of heartbreak and betrayal. After her beau, Isaac Hanson, left the Yukon, she made a vow to wait for him. When she's sold to a brothel owner after the death of her father, Addie manages to escape with the hope that she can forever hide her past and the belief that she will never have the future she's always dreamed of. (This is the first book in the series.)

Count the Nights by Stars by Michelle Shocklee

1961. After a longtime resident at Nashville's historic Maxwell House Hotel suffers a debilitating stroke, Audrey Whitfield is tasked with cleaning out the room. There, she finds a scrapbook filled with memorabilia from the Tennessee Centennial Exposition. Love notes on the backs of unmailed postcards inside capture Audrey with tales of forbidden love. Audrey and the handsome hotel guest track down clues and information about the mysterious "Peaches" and her regrets over one day, almost sixty-five years earlier.

1897. Outspoken and forward-thinking Priscilla Nichols isn't willing to settle for just any man. She's still holding out hope for love when she meets Luca Moretti. Charmed by him, Priscilla spends time exploring the sights of the expo with Luca. Haunted by a terrible truth, Priscilla and Luca are sent down separate paths as the night's stars fade into dawn.

The Matchmakers Series by Jen Turano

<u>A Match in the Making</u> - When Gwendolyn Brinley accepted a paid companion position for the Newport season, she never imagined she'd be expected to take over responsibilities as an assistant matchmaker. Tasked with finding the season's catch, Walter Townsend, a wife, her assignment becomes increasingly difficult when she realizes his perfect match might be...her. (This is the first book in the series.)

Sat-7 is celebrating 27 years of broadcasting their ministry to the Middle East! Many testimonials come from those who tune in regularly to hear their broadcast. They



are turning to Christ! Satellite TV and the internet offer substantial leverage. While there are some attempts to censor the internet, young people find ways to get around the barriers. And it is virtually impossible to block satellite TV. Most people in the Middle East and North Africa, even the poor, have access to satellite TV.

Samaritan's Purse continues to help rebuild homes in tornado areas. They are providing manufactured homes that are built to withstand 110 mph winds. Throughout Mississippi, Alabama, Arkansas, and Tennessee, they are not only helping to supply housing, but also installing hundreds of underground storm shelters next to existing houses so families have a place of refuge.

Thank you to the crew who helped with the ice cream making and Annual Chicken BBQ. We sold over 500 halves of chicken and countless quarts of ice cream. The total will be posted later.

Thank you to Jenn Sparks for taking care of the baby bottles this year. The last of the bottles have come in and our total donation will be announced in the bulletin.
