Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Before that rolls around our group of eight BDM volunteers will be visiting the ARK in Kentucky before heading further west to Dawson Springs, KY to work on tornado rebuilding. The Sunday after we get back, Jeremy Goodling will be at Free Spring, and we look forward to his sharing in both services as well as during the Sunday school hour.

It's almost ten years ago that we were sharing in the study of Kyle Idleman's book <u>AHA</u>, <u>Awakening Honesty Action</u>. He offers a line from the movie *Braveheart* as a call to action:

"Fight and you may die. Run and you'll live – at least a while. And dying in your beds many years from now, would you be willing to trade all the days – from this day to that – for one chance, just one chance, to come back here and tell our enemies that they may take our lives, but they'll never take our freedom!"

Idleman calls us as followers of Jesus to be men and women of action, but he makes this observation in AHA: "It's an interesting irony about us as a society – we love action, but we would rather watch it than live it. We'll sit on the couch and order a pizza while we watch gourmet-cooking shows. We'll watch a home-improvement network for hours, and then get ourselves a drink from a leaky faucet...We love action, but we'd rather watch it than do it!"

I pray that this would not be true when we see that great needs surround us. Not everyone can go out on BDM trips, but everyone can make a donation to the Food Pantry or Bethesda Mission. Maybe this is the year to do a Christmas shoebox for Operation Christmas Child. They will be sharing during our worship services the Sunday our BDM group arrives in Kentucky.

During this month of Thanksgiving, let's be thankful for the way God has blessed us and be thankful for the many opportunities He has given us to share those blessings. May the men and women of Free Spring be *actively* thankful! Thank the Lord for freedom in Jesus!

The One You're With by Lauren K, Denton

Mac and Edie Swan lead a picture-perfect life in sleepy Spring Hill, Alabama – until a young woman walks into Mac's office whose existence threatens their roles as parents, their reputation in the community, and the foundations of their marriage. As both examine the choices they made during a long-ago summer apart, can they forge a new future?

The All-American by Susie Finkbeiner

In 1952, other 16-year-old girls dream of getting married and raising children, but Bertha Harding only has eyes for baseball! When her father is suspected of being a Communist, the family is disgraced, shunned, and forced to move. Will Bertha discard her dreams of playing with professionals – or pack her bags for the adventure of a lifetime?

A Novel Proposal by Denise Hunter

With sales tanking, Western writer Sadie must pen a romance. The problem? She's never fallen in love! Determined to succeed, she starts collecting and studying love stories. When she discovers an engagement ring tucked inside a book, she entices reluctant neighbor Sam into helping locate the owner. Has she stumbled upon the hero for her novel – and life?

By Way of Moonlight by Elizabeth Musser

But when Redd leads an unauthorized raid on the villa, he discovers they've been set up, and he is sent home to face the consequences of defying orders. FOOD SERVICES NEEDS: #10 cans of vegetables, sugar, napkins, BBQ sauce, spices, multipurpose cleaners, aprons, prepackaged disposable utensils, 4" metal pans

Listed below are some other items that are currently needed:

MEN'S MISSION: 13 and 30-gal plastic trash bags, winter clothing: thermal underwear, sweatshirts, long-sleeved shirts (Under Armor, etc. and plus sized L-XXX are needed most), large print Bibles (NIV, NASB, or ESV), shower shoes (flip flops), wash cloths and towels, underwear (large sizes), batteries (AA, AAA, and 9-volt), umbrellas, winter boots (sizes 10-13), and pillows

WOMEN'S MISSION: paper products, stamps, headphones/ear buds, nylon knee stockings, phone chargers, bus passes, gallon-size zip-lock bags, 3x, 4x, and 5x clothing (pants and shirts)
