The following are fiction books; some are part of a series.

He Should Have Told the Bees by Amanda Cox



Beekeeper Beckett Walsh was living her dream, working alongside her father on their small farm, until his

unexpected death thrusts a new part-owner into her world. Callie Peterson threatens not only her livelihood, but her beliefs about the goodness of the man she'd always perceived to be her kind and faithful father.

The Wings of Poppy Pendleton by Melanie Dobson

1907 – On her fifth birthday, Poppy Pendleton vanishes from the family's Thousand Islands castle and her father's found dead. 1992 – Chloe, living near the Pendleton ruins, has no interest in the local mystery, until little Emma arrives with a scrapbook connecting her to Poppy's family. When a reporter begins asking questions, will the haunting truth save Emma's life?

The Swiss Nurse by Mario Escobar

When Germany invades Poland, an avalanche of humanity sweeps into France. In the cascade of crises that follow, Isabel and Elisabeth learn the cost, and the unexpected joy, of sacrifice. Elisabeth Eidenbenz left Switzerland in 1937 to aid children orphaned during the Spanish Civil War. Now, her work has led her to France, where she's determined to provide expectant mothers and their unborn children a refuge amid one of the worst humanitarian crises of the twentieth century. Based on the true stories of refugees, and the woman who risked everything to save them, <u>The Swiss Nurse</u> shares a message of love and strength amid one of history's often overlooked conflicts.

Undaunted Courage Series by Irene Hannon

<u>Into the Fire</u> – When arson investigator Bri Tucker inherits unfinished business from her predecessor, she must convince ATF Special Agent Marc Davis to help her find the missing link, and track down a serial arsonist who will stop at nothing – including murder – to carry out a nefarious plan. (This is the first book in the series.)

Waters of Time Series by Jody Hedlund

<u>Come Back to Me</u> – Scientist Marian Creighton was skeptical of her father's lifelong research of ancient holy water – until she ingests some of it and finds herself transported back to the Middle Ages. With the help of an emotionally wounded nobleman, can she make her way back home?

Or will she be trapped in the past forever? (This is the first book in the series,)

Facing the Enemy by Diann Mills

When the long-awaited reunion between Risa and her brother Trenton ends in tragedy, Risa is riddled with guilt, unable to cope with the responsibility she feels over his death. On leave from the FBI, Risa returns to her former career as an English teacher at a local college, only to see her past and present collide when one of her students, Carson Mercury, turns in an assignment that reads like an eyewitness account of her brother's murder, along with details never revealed publicly.

This is Where it Ends by Cindy K. Sproles

Widow Minerva Jenkins has lived alone in her small mountain home for 40 years, where she has guarded her husband's deathbed request. When a young reporter comes calling and inquires about a rumored box of gold on her property, an unlikely friendship forms. Will she go to her grave with her husband's secret, or will the weight of it be the death of her?

If you haven't heard about it already, we packed 407 bags

of Christmas Cookies for Carlisle Truck Stop Ministry. Wow!!!! We would like to thank all of our cookie bakers and all who came that morning to help. It was a very blessed event!!! There was a voicemail at the church from a truck driver named Arnaldo Orlandi. When Lona returned his call he told her, "I've been driving truck here in the United States for two years now, after moving here from Brazil. I received one of your bags of cookies and wanted you to know how blessed I was by this. Thank you so much for making my Christmas that much brighter."

A special thanks to all who donated to Bethesda Mission. A picture of the table-full of items can be seen on the church's web page and on the church's Facebook page. Notes from December's report from Bethesda: The Men's Mission received a much-needed face lift. The failing facade was restored and the parking lot repaved and painted. The Mission provides long-term shelter for around 100 individuals at a time. The Women's Mission officially opened last August. This has allowed them to increase capacity. They are working hard to get women off the streets or out of abusive homes and into the long-term recovery program. The original Community Center has been torn down and they are looking forward to a new building in its place. This Center will include classrooms, meeting space, and kitchen, and will be able to increase the outreach to families, teens, and children throughout Harrisburg. A few more facts: No money comes from government. 73% comes from private donations, 5% from church donations, 3% from special events, 5% from businesses, 7% from foundations, and 7% from planned giving. They have a website that has much more information at bethesdamission.org

Pennsylvania Adult and Teen Challenge has a commitment to help men and women receive the need to overcome substance abuse and return to their community healthy. During the year they received over 27,000 calls for help, provided 120 scholarships, over 240 decisions for Christ, 2,600 people were served, and \$360,000 in scholarship dollars was used.

Please place unused envelopes in Lona's mailbox or on the table in the narthex so that they may be reused.




Christmas Card Donations
