Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I wonder if my sense of humor and my faith would be intact if I were faced with the personal and political rough spots that Abraham Lincoln had to deal with. Professor John Morreall notes that, "He was President during the worst years this country has ever seen...Lincoln's family

life was also a recipe for sadness. His wife...suffered frequent migraine headaches, depression, and physical illnesses. Her hot temper and mood swings often made her hard to live with."

Lincoln lost two sons, ages three and eleven, to disease. Morreall says, "What saved Lincoln from despair amid all this tragedy was his sense of humor, especially his love of funny stories. At cabinet meetings during the Civil War, he regularly picked up a humorous book and read passages aloud. When his cabinet officers objected, he said, 'Gentlemen, why don't you laugh? With the fearful strain that is upon me night and day, if I did not laugh I should die, and you need this medicine as much as I do.'"

God sends us "good medicine" in so many forms besides the ones in pill bottles. The month of February brings us to a celebration of romantic and familial love. It just so happens that Valentine's Day falls on Ash Wednesday this year. We celebrate with hearts, flowers, candy; and cards. We also celebrate with communion on Ash Wednesday. (Lest I forget, we celebrate the day before with donut mania!)

So it is that we celebrate love in the secular sense and in the divine sense as we begin the season of Lent. We begin the six-week journey toward Easter and the new growth of spring. For some folks, that means giving up certain food or activities, presumably to focus more on godly pursuits. One publication suggests something else in "What to give up for Lent":

Give up complaining...focus on gratitude. Give up worry...trust God. Give up anger...be more patient. Give up bitterness...turn to forgiveness. Give up discouragement...be full of hope. Give up gossiping...control your tongue. Give up pessimism...become an optimist. Give up hatred...return good for evil. Give up harsh judgments...think kindly thoughts. Give up sin...turn to virtue.

Give up gloom...enjoy the beauty that is all around you.

Brothers and Sisters, may you add to the beauty that is around you by being a blessing to all whom you meet.

The following are fiction books; some are part of a series.



The Librarian of Saint-Malo by Mario Escobar

As war with Germany rages, Jocelyn focuses on encouraging the people of her coastal French village with

literature. In letters to a famous author, she describes the Nazi occupation of Saint-Malo as they transform the town into a fortress and ruthlessly purge its libraries. Will Jocelyn sacrifice all while caring for the people she loves?

Missing in Alaska Series by Elizabeth Goddard

<u>Cold Light of Day</u> – Police Chief Autumn Long is fighting to keep her job in the quiet Alaska town of Shadow Gap when an unexpected string of criminal activity leaves her with a wounded officer, unexplained murders, and even an attack on her own father. Despite her mistrust of outsiders, she turns to Grier Brenner, a newcomer who seems to have the skills and training Autumn needs to face this threat to her community. (This is the first book in the series.)

Waters of Time Series by Jody Hedlund

<u>Never Leave Me</u> – Ellen Creighton has decided to live out her remaining days at the estate of her longtime friend, Harrison Burlington. Harrison cares deeply for Ellen, but as a wheelchair-bound paraplegic, he's never allowed himself to get serious in a relationship. However, he's desperately trying to save her by finding the holy water that is believed to heal any disease. (This is the second book in the series; the first book is <u>Come</u> <u>Back to Me</u>.)

Everywhere to Hide by Siri Mitchell

Recent law school graduate Whitney Garrison works two jobs and studies for the bar exam while grappling with a neurological condition that prevents her from distinguishing one face from another. But after she witnesses a murder, the killer seems able to anticipate her every move. Whom should Whitney believe when she can't even trust herself?

The Tapestry of Grace by Kim Vogel Sawyer

Alexandertol's schoolteacher, Augusta Dyck, is glad for some meaningful work to occupy her time. She helps quiet, reserved, widower Konrad Rempel and his young twin sons. Konrad, however, is adamant that he doesn't want help. His boys are mischievous but good-hearted. And though Konrad may be struggling, he doesn't want anyone else sticking their nose in and telling him what his sons need. Or what he needs. For her part, the charity's founder, Martina Krahn, is relieved to have a reason to spend time outside her unhappy home. It even occurs to her that she may, through her work, encounter a boy in need of a family and so find a son for her husband since they have no children of their own. Augusta, Konrad, and Martina each have deep needs and desires, and each imagines how they should be met: by reaching out or by being left alone.

Songs for a Sunday by Heather Norman Smith

Travel this winding road with two sets of sisters, two generations apart! In 1963, Annie must sacrifice her dreams for her younger sister's indiscretion. In present day, Missy's journey to self-discovery forces her out of her younger sister's shadow, but she soon discovers her grandmother's 60-year-old secret. Will Missy conceal the deception or reveal the truth?
