A Message from our District Executive

I watched a video of a young woman who has Tourette's Syndrome. In case you do not know what Tourette's is, the following excerpt from Wikipedia may help:

Tourette syndrome or Tourette's syndrome (abbreviated as TS or Tourette's) is a common neurodevelopmental disorder that begins in childhood or adolescence. It is characterized by multiple movement (motor) tics and at least one vocal (phonic) tic. Common tics are blinking, coughing, throat clearing, sniffing, and facial movements. These are typically preceded by an unwanted urge or sensation in the affected muscles known as a premonitory urge, can sometimes be suppressed temporarily, and characteristically change in location, strength, and frequency. Tourette's is at the more severe end of a spectrum of tic disorders. The tics often go unnoticed by casual observers. Tourette's was once regarded as a rare and bizarre syndrome and has popularly been associated with coprolalia (the utterance of obscene words or socially inappropriate and derogatory remarks). It is no longer considered rare; about 1% of school-age children and adolescents are estimated to have Tourette's, and coprolalia occurs only in a minority.

In the video, the woman was asked where some of her vocal tics came from. Her answer was from watching Tik Tok videos. In other words, she mimicked what she was watching. It reminded me of the adage about computer programing: "Garbage In, Garbage Out." My mind also meandered back to that old Sunday School song that told us to "Be careful little eyes what you see." Our brains are far more complex than I can understand but I heard that our brains retain every bit of information that we see, hear, or read. The problem for us is that we can't always remember just exactly where it is stored! So, all that "stuff" is in there and just waiting to come out. Many of us have internal sensors that help stay socially acceptable and out of trouble.

I think there is a better answer for us than just relying on that internal sensor. (Actually, since it is in God's word, I KNOW it is better!)

"Teach me, LORD, the way of your decrees, that I may follow it to the end. Give me understanding, so that I may keep your law and obey it with all my heart. Direct me in the path of your commands, for there I find delight. Turn my heart toward your statutes and not toward selfish gain. *Turn my eyes away from worthless things;* preserve my life according to your word." Psalm 119:33-3 (emphasis mine)

Time spent in God's word is crucial for filling our minds with things that lead to better living and keep us from wrong thinking, wrong living, and wrong speech. It also provides a way for God to expose those things which are harmful and/or detrimental to our Christian witness.



Breakthrough in Understanding U.S. Alcohol and Drug Problems!

Did you know that statistics used to measure alcohol and other drug use in America will also now include information about mental health issues? It is a significant fact in understanding the real issues as the use of these substances continue through each generation.

The last statistical fact is alarming, 13% considered suicide.

Here are some results from the last study:

- 133 million Americans over age 12 used alcohol in last 30 days.
- 7 million were 12-17 and 50 million were 18-25 years old.
- 30 million identified as having Alcohol Use Disorder (AUD).
- 7 million of those with AUD also have Drug Use Disorder.
- 18-25-year-olds were the largest group of dual use (alcohol/ drug disorder).
- Major depressive episodes were highest among 18-25-yearolds.
- New users in 2021—4.1 million alcohol/2.6 million marijuana.
- 2.5 million Americans over age 12 used marijuana.
- 40% of those vaping marijuana were 12-17 (the largest age group).
- 20% marijuana users had major depressive episodes.
- 13% of all drug-using age groups had suicide thoughts.

Summary: The American population continues to show wear and tear from overused alcohol/drugs as a recreational pastime. As you go through the numbers, you'll see the hardest hit are the 18-25-year-olds. They are in college, military or in the workforce. This may be a lost generation. Not if we can help it.

We have a chance to make a difference with the 12-17-yearolds. Sadly, 13% of them have considered suicide, had major depressive episodes and tried drugs like alcohol and marijuana (vaping the preferred marijuana method of use.) Most parents I talk to trust schools to teach their children about these subjects. Very few will educate themselves about the drugs and effects well enough to be a good information source. Based on that need, you can send PCAP there! We will educate and work with all ages including parents. We will go to your schools and churches to reach and teach about the issues that matter. BIBLE MOMENT

PCAP School News

We are currently teaching many health classes in school districts grades 6-12. Most of the current subjects the teachers want covered are vaping nicotine, vaping marijuana, alcohol and its effects, drugged driving, good decision-making and alcohol, drugs and dating. A key lesson is "think about the condition of the driver when you're getting into their car."

One of our newest approaches to teaching is to feature Natural High Living as an alternative to a drug life. We see this as a door opener to discuss the good things in life as a better choice.

We continue to teach abstinence from all alcohol and other drugs as a best choice. Natural High shares this view.

MAY—We have had Easter come and go but should we? Easter, the Resurrection of Christ, is an ongoing celebration for all Christians all over the world, isn't it? Easter is more than bunnies, chocolate and days off from work and school. Some will know Easter as a time of partying and traveling to a Southern beach resort. Pray that those that live this way will come to know the real reason we celebrate Easter. The month of May is also a time we see proms, graduations and summer-break plans shaping up. Many will use this time as an excuse to get high. Pray that those young people will not see tragedy, will make good choices and, instead, will be interested in the Goodness of knowing Jesus.

JUNE—We are heading into summer! The freedom of no school and the lack of structure will affect many young people badly. Instead of chasing good things, they will choose to use this time as party time. Drugs like alcohol can become a daily activity because there is no reason to worry about being sober. Please pray that those young people not fall into this type of foolishness. Also pray they find good things in their lives to pursue. Free time can be good times for those who want to know Christ more fully. This is another prayer we all could embrace on their behalf.

JULY—Summer, fireworks, baseball and great outdoor times! For many, the idea of picnics comes to mind. These are great chances families have to grow together, unfortunately, it is often coupled with some alcohol or other drugs as a social requirement or expectation. Pray that these gatherings will not center on the act of using a substance to artificially lift one's spirits but instead that the act of gathering together is in itself enough! This is so important, especially for the little ones. Pray that they remember good wholesome family gatherings with no alcohol or drugs in sight. Pray that their parents are aware of the examples they make for children to see.

AUGUST—The biggest vacation month. Pray that the travels, vacations and other summer memories have no alcohol or drugs in the mix. Pray that the "one last fling" before school restarts won't include using illegal substances as a way to get ready for school.

SEPTEMBER—Many kids are facing new schools, new friends, new places, new challenges and new hopes. Disappointment could be right there also if things don't go well. Some will feel unable to fit in, feel uncomfortable, not understand what is expected and have dashed hopes of being good at something. Pray for those who are struggling with these challenges. Pray they find joy and peace in these and many other challenges as the school year reveals itself. Lastly, pray they find good Christian classmates and friends that can lead them in a pathway for righteousness.

OCTOBER—Kids are often affected by seasonal sadness over the changing of the clocks, the cold winter days and the lack of exercise they get from being indoors so much. Teachers are affected by this too. Pray for all to have good thoughts, positive activities and alcohol/drug-free days.

NOVEMBER—Thanksgiving! Football! Pumpkin Pie! Not everybody gets excited about these things like I do. Many from other cultures are not even aware of what all this means. Consider they are in a season of change during these next holidays. Schools are full of mixtures of cultures, religions and different family compositions. We can't assume we know what it feels like for others. This is what I ask you to pray about: How can we be most supportive and loving during this time of year? How can we help others feel like they are part of our lives too? Think about young persons and what they are thinking. How can we show Christ to them? Pray for them.

DECEMBER—Christians know this is the month of celebration! Christ is born! We also know that the young ones will be taking a break from schools, spending more time at home and hanging out with friends. Pray they are on their guard to weigh their decisions carefully. Pray they think before they act. Pray the best for them. Pray, as we always pray, they come to know Christ!

Thank you for your support by being a **Prayer Warrior!** We can't be an island unto ourselves. Proverbs says: "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and don't lean on your own understanding." Prayer is an admittance that we need to come before our Lord with pleas and needs. FAR Reach Ministries Faith. Action. Results. An occasional newsletter heralding education for the Church of the Brethren in the Africa Great Lakes region The socalled "Prosperity Gospel" manifests itself in so many ways that, at least for me, it often pops up with an aspect that I haven't heard before. I suppose that it takes us back to Satan's lies starting in Genesis 3 that are continually circling back around with a new twist. It must be pointed out that the word gospel in this context is used quite loosely, since gospel means good news. These prosperity teachings can hardly be considered good news. They are, quite frankly, lies from the devil. A few examples: - A pastor preaches that his followers will be struck dead by God if they don't bring their tithe. - It is claimed that the sick child will not be healed unless the parents give X number of shillings, francs or dollars. - A message of "tongues" (unintelligible gibberish) is "interpreted" (by the tongues-speaker himself) saying that so-and-so will die and the tongues-speaker will marry his widow. - When the pastor comes to visit and expects not only a meal (common hospitality) but also demands a chicken, goat or other "gift" from the host - and if it's not received, goes around the village, as well as exclaiming from the pulpit that the person lacks Christian faith. Pastors are men and women called of God to be shepherds. They are ones that lead by faithfully teaching the truths of Scripture, not the lies that they might manage to wrest from it or the lies that they have come up with on their own. They are ones that lead by nurturing - showing by example the way of Jesus. They are ones that might well enjoy some benefit from their flock, but not from butchering them! I'm certainly not opposed to butchering/meat eating and it's not my purpose to get into an argument today on the subject. But I will argue that the farmer's role is to nurture those animals - to care, feed and provide for them. The Bible in both the Old and New Testaments draws the analogy of the pastor's role to that of shepherd. In the King James Version the old English word husbandman appears occasionally. It is largely unused these days; Deloris and I have Batchelor of Science degrees from Delaware Valley College in

Dairy Husbandry. That was 1978 - now the college turned university calls it Dairy Science. But as the word husbandry implies, it's all about caring and nurturing. Those of us in pastoral roles are "husbands" (sorry for the gender specific terminology). Not that we should think we're married to the church (in spite of the belief of some church members). Rather that we should see our call to "feed my sheep" similarly to Paul's admonition in Ephesians 5 for husbands to love their wives as Christ loved the church. The call is to care for people in such a way as Jesus shared His life - with peace, simplicity and yes, sacrifice. At the top of the list of emphases at the Great Lakes Bible School (GLBS) is the concept of servant leadership. Within the context of GLBS, it hasn't been a particular challenge to teach. We are, after all, a Brethren institution. Stratification of sociological castes is, at least in theory, at the heart of who we are. There has been though, over the years, attempts to delineate a system of hierarchy in the church with clergy on the higher level, along with a subtle put-down of the laity. In opposition to this there have been those that want to bring the church leadership down a notch or two. Theologian Elton Trueblood wrote that our goal should not be to bring the clergy down to the level of the laity, but to elevate the laity to the level of the clergy. In his words, the abolition of the laity. The goal of the servant leader, it would seem, should be to provide teaching, nurturing, and encouragement to the church. Didn't someone once say something about the priesthood of all believers? The church is not a barn full of sheep destined for the slaughterhouse. We are Christ's chosen people. "But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people of his own possession, that you may proclaim the excellencies of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light. Once you were not a people, but now you are God's people; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy." I Peter 2:9-10 ESV The "prosperity" preachers that I find popping up around these parts are building a house on a very sandy surface. Some of them, having a bit of charisma, will do fairly well - for a time at least. I have a namesake



Villager Earns Prestigious Art Distinction

Villager Sue Fehringer from Cross Keys Village – The Brethren Home Community has had a long career as a mathematician, teaching at Gettysburg High School and Gettysburg College. As much as she loves numbers, she also has a passion for mixed-media art. At one point, she had been an active member of the York Art Association. However, life gets in the way, and by the time she moved to Cross Keys Village in 2020, Sue had been on a 10-year pause from participating in the York Art Association's events.

Because of Cross Keys' close proximity to York, and with time on her hands at last, Sue decided to enter the association's Annual Fall Member Show held in September. She submitted her intriguing mixed-media piece **Crows at Sunset**, which features two main layers. For the back, she painted layers of acrylic on Yupo paper to evoke a sunset. On the front layer of clear acetate, she used Halloween spider webbing and watercolors to create an arborescent texture, with crows done in acrylic. Sue inserted an extra matte board between the two layers while framing the piece, generating additional dimension. This ingenious use of texture, color and depth didn't go unrecognized: out of the 100 works submitted in the event, **Sue won Best in Show!**

YAA's Board member Suzanne Stoltenberg remembers: "When Sue Fehringer's painting won Best of Show this fall, the juror said he felt each layer of the work was thoughtfully arranged, and the painting was filled with colors and textures. He loved how she created crisp silhouettes of the birds but used more gestural strokes in other areas, something professional painters frequently do to lead the eye of the viewer to the center of interest."

Not one to brag, Sue simply recalls "For me to win alongside all that talent, I felt very privileged and honored. It was nice to have that recognition." As if that didn't make Sue proud enough, an unknown admirer purchased the piece.

Closer to home, Sue participates regularly in the art exhibits organized our Life Enrichment team, right here on the CKV campus. Whether or not she enters another art show, you can bet Sue will be creating more captivating pieces in the future.

Pastor Claver

In the Shadow

Among my favorite places on the planet is the little village of Gasiza in Rwanda. Nestled in the Virunga mountains, it isn't exactly remote, as it's less than a one hour drive from our home in Gisenyi. But a good bit of the journey is over very poor roads, giving one the impression that it's farther out than it really is. The location is so beautiful that it might be described as stunning. The farms are well maintained and very productive. There are onions, cabbages, potatoes, beans, tomatoes, maize, bananas, eggplant, mangoes, avocados - and the list goes on. One hears dairy cows lowing and sheep bleating in the background. The view is incredible. On a clear day you can see Lake Kivu in the distance, as well as the volcano Mt. Niyirigongo in neighboring Congo. But the real reason it is one of my favorite spots is the Gasiza Church of the Brethren. The congregation is led by Peter Claver Habimana, a fifty-something man with a dear little wife, Mama Josephine, and a family of eight children. When a younger man, he was, by his own description, a drunkard and an atheist. God miraculously saved him and changed his life. He eventually became the pastor of a Pentecostal church and ultimately joined the Brethren in 2015. Pastor Claver, as we call him, doesn't have much education. He is though, a very gifted preacher, with a big heart. He works very hard as a bivocational pastor. Along with service to the church he is a carpenter and a farmer. His embodiment of a solid work ethic is powerful in an environment where many pastors are expecting others to do and provide for them. As a student at the Great Lakes Bible School (GLBS), Pastor Claver is learning English, applying previously learned





Bible knowledge, and just as importantly, serving as a wonderful example for the others. One of the key teachings we are emphasizing in the Great Lakes Bible School is servant leadership. While a pastor is indeed a leader of people, he is also a servant. I suppose that most would recognize the importance of a pastor's submission to the Master Jesus Christ. But all too often, leaders are subsequently expecting their church members to be in submission to them, rather than leading with the understanding that we all are in submission to each other (Ephesians 5:21). Another important feature of GLBS is the mix of students and faculty. Age, education and experience range across the spectrum. At 66, I'm the oldest one. Our view is that the older ones will mentor the younger and that the younger bring energy and vitality. It has been heartwarming to watch the interactions among the students. The mentoring is quite obviously taking place, but the energy is also apparent, not only from the younger to the elder, but a mutual iron-sharpening-iron. Even though pastors like Claver are the seasoned ones, there is no attitude of superiority. This past Sunday, Theoneste (principal/head teacher) and I, along with our two Burundian students made the road trip to Gasiza for morning worship. We arrived at 9 as the folks were just gathering. The music started promptly, with lots of dancing to accompany the singing. The four choirs took turns leading the congregation as the pastor intermittently spoke and read from the Scriptures. The guest preacher (me) shared for a half hour or so. After a closing song and prayer, the service concluded shortly before noon. As the congregation dispersed, we stayed behind with the pastor and deacons. A feast was spread before us of beef, potatoes, rice, beans and Fanta. I noticed that neither the pastor nor his wife were eating. They were both busy ensuring that everyone else was taken care of. Finally, when all were served, they sat down to eat their own meal. I pointed this out to Theoneste. He said, "You're right they are servant leaders." It is my prayer that all of our church leaders here in the Africa Great Lakes region will learn by their example. Course Description and Objectives

What do Brethren believe? How do these beliefs translate into practice? This course will answer these questions and others by exploring Brethren beliefs related to a variety of issues, including Scripture, the person of Jesus Christ, the Holy Spirit, the nature of the church, original sin, and the end times. We will discuss how these beliefs shape our understanding of Brethren ordinances, such as baptism, Love Feast, anointing, nonresistance, and nonconformity. Particular attention will be paid to the Pietist and Anabaptist origins of Brethren beliefs. The course will also examine how these beliefs and practices have changed over time and consider the diversity of beliefs found among Brethren today.
