Simple Living

Abavandimwe! Brothers and sisters! There are many practical reasons for simple living, but I want ultimately to help us understand the biblical reasons. I don't want to make something simple to be complicated! We have, as a church, tried to legislate simple living. Clothing, hair styles, carpet, lightning rods. The old stone farmhouse that I grew up in was built in the later years of the 1700's. My great-great-great-great grandfather Abraham Rinehart was censured by the Coventry church because of the beautiful raised panel cherry doors in the house.

But there are several things that I want to consider, along with a biblical framework (and a few Kinyarwanda words) - contentment, work, thrift, and generosity.

- 1. Contentment (kunyurwa nibyo ufite) Exodus 20:7-17; Matthew 6:19-34; I Timothy 6:6-10.
- 2. Work (akazi) Genesis 2:15 and 3:17-19; I Thessalonians 4:11-12; II Thessalonians 3:6-12.
- 3. Thrift (kwita ku bintu) Matthew 6:19-34; Proverbs 31:30-34. Conservation, recycling, cleanliness, care of things.
- 4. Generosity (Ubuntu) Matthew 25:31-46; Luke 18:18-25; 19:1-10; II Corinthians 9:6-15; I John 2:15-17.

I never saw my grandfather, Martin Urner, as he died a few years before I was born. I learned, however, from an old friend, that he was esteemed by his brethren in the church and ministry as a preacher of more than ordinary ability; so much so, that at their yearly meetings he was always called upon to preach. My friend said that on one occasion when the Yearly Meeting was held in Philadelphia, as the preachers from the country were jogging along on horseback, going to the meeting, one of the preachers said to my grandfather, 'As you will no doubt be called upon to preach at this meeting, I want you to preach particularly against the wearing of fine clothes, as the brethren and sisters of Philadelphia are becoming entirely too fashionable in their dress.' And although he urged the matter lengthily, he thought my grandfather did not give all heed to what he said, and asked, 'Did you hear what I said?' The answer was, 'Yes.' The next question was, 'Will you do it?' My grandfather replied, 'If I am called upon to preach, I hope I shall have something of more importance to talk to people about than the rags with which they clothe themselves.

So, considering that even our righteousness is as filthy rags, do I have a point here? Is there a valid argument for simple living? What IS simple living? It is finding contentment with what God has granted us and has asked of us. Finding joy in the work God has called us to. Not being wasteful of the resources of time and material. And just as importantly, being generous with these resources that we've refused to waste.

Biblical Reasons for a SIMPLE LIFESTYLE ~ Georgia Markey, Interim D.E.

Simple living refers to practices that promote simplicity in one's lifestyle. Common practices of simple living include,

- *reducing the number of possessions one owns
- *depending less on technology and services
- *spending less money
- *not keeping up with the neighbors or coworkers
- *not needing to dress according to current styles, etc.

Henry David Thoreau, an American naturalist and author made his classic secular advocacy of life of a simple and sustainable living, in his book, "Walden" (1854). Thoreau concluded that our lives are frittered away by detail.

On Sunday, July 27th, 2025, Southern PA District Witness Commission hosted what we believe may be the first picnic for our District. (See Pg. 3) Approximately 50-60 persons, from our twenty-seven congregations, gathered at Little Buffalo State Park, Newport, PA. 

Plans are underway for the 48th Brethren Disaster Relief Auction to be held on September 26 and 27, 2025, at the Lebanon EXPO Center. Several changes have occurred in the past year. We have a new treasurer, Lynette Gelsinger and two additional people have joined the Board of Directors. Our mission is to provide funding for disaster relief efforts throughout the US and Internationally through Brethren Disaster Ministries, which is the primary recipient of Auction funds.

Significant income was generated by the 47th Auction held September 27 and 28, 2024.


Overall gross proceeds were approximately \$350,452, (including direct contributions and estate bequests) leaving approximately \$300,000 for distribution.

In the Shadow Walking With Boldness

"For God has not given us a spirit of fear, but of power, and of love, and of a sound mind."

2 Timothy 1:7 NKJV

"Let no one look down on your youthfulness, but rather in speech, conduct, love, faith, and purity, show yourself an example of those who believe."

1 Timothy 4:12 NASB

Did you know that approximately 50 % of the Rwandan population is under 20 years old? Sub-Saharan Africa has the youngest median age on the planet, at 19 years. Unfortunately, many of these young people are unemployed, helping at home or searching for informal work, which may include working as a day laborer for a farmer or housecleaning.

I am privileged to partner with a sewing cooperative that



empowers young people with sewing skills so they can provide for themselves and their families. We recently added to our number of students, and now there are around 70 students that are busy learning to measure, cut, and sew beautiful bags and apparel out of spectacularly colorful traditional fabric.

The Grace Academy nursery school recently celebrated the end of the year

with a graduation for the Top Class members. In September they will go on to the first level of primary school, or first grade, as we call it in the American context.

That is a brief overview of some of the things I have been working with the last few months. It's so exciting to see what God has been doing in this corner of Africa!





Now, moving on to some recent musings of mine...

It is now twenty and four years that I have existed on this spherical planet we dwell upon. However, I am often mistaken to be still in the adolescent years due to having a "baby face". It is more than three years that I have lived on the African continent. The locals will often not take youthful persons seriously in a context where one is not considered a "proper adult" until marriage. There have been many things I have experienced in those three plus years that some may never face in their lives. Many things I would not even wish on any person that has ever walked this earth. I resonate with the thought of being an old soul in a youthful body.

Indeed, Africa has adopted me as her daughter. I recall walking down the stairway from the airplane into the humid air of Kigali, Rwanda on a warm October night, approaching four years ago. Breathing in the heady scent of eucalyptus smoke as I stepped onto Rwandan soil for the first time, I had no idea that this would be the place I would be blessed to call home. I had just turned twenty-one, a sheltered home-school graduate, naive Anabaptist farm girl from Pennsylvania. God has a sense of humor when He takes the people who think they are unqualified to do anything out of the ordinary. I would more likely have thought that I would be married by this time with a child or two (or three).

"God doesn't call the qualified, He qualifies the called."

I may not have a husband or have borne children by the age I am now, but I am the mother of many. As a teacher, one becomes a mother to the children that come through school doors. I often refer to any child as my child, regardless if I know them or not. I would do anything in my power to protect a child, even if it means the end of my days.

I recall such a day in January of this year, the day the M-23 rebels captured Goma. Some missionary friends of mine were away, but their young daughters were still home. I was asked to escort them out of the city, to a neighboring village that was hoped to be safer. As I walked out of the relative safety of my compound walls, I did not know what I would see or what might happen. Sounds of machine-gun fire filled my ears. Bomb explosions shook the ground. Strangely, I did not feel frightened. I felt nothing as the ancient minibus shook with every bomb blast as it labored through the traffic to the mountains, our hoped refuge. I only began to fear as the bombing echoed louder and stronger throughout the hills. People I cared about were still in the middle of the fighting. I could hear the sounds of war as I talked to a friend in the heart of the cross-border fighting. I heard terror in her voice.

With all praise to the living God, each of us survived those days. Days we shall remember for the rest of our lives.

In recent times, I have discovered that I indeed have repressed trauma from that event. Our bodies and minds will keep score of such things and bring them to light in a time and place otherwise regarded as safe. I look back now and realize that I was actually terrified, but there were others whose safety I needed to secure. Survival and maternal instincts took over in split-second decisions. So quickly that I hardly realized what I was doing.

Our God has put all of us on this earth for some purpose. He can use the young, the old, those terrified of their own shadow, and those that may think they are incapable of great things. We are indeed capable of much more than our minds believe. He fills us with strength for the times in which we live, for challenges that come our way, so that we can walk with confidence and boldness through the days of our lives.

Election Procedures

- From July until December each year, the Nominating Committee gathers nominations from across
 the denomination. This process seeks balance among the nominees between female and male,
 younger and older, rural and urban, geographic location, theological perspectives, and skill sets.
- 2. The Nominating Committee meets in early January to prepare a ballot of four names for each position. That ballot is distributed only to the current Standing Committee members (those who served at the previous Annual Conference), who keep that ballot confidential. The Standing Committee's vote reduces the ballot to two nominees per position. This is the tentative final ballot that will be presented at the Annual Conference. It is announced to the denomination at large in February (AC Minutes 2001).
- 3. Anyone making a nomination from the floor of Annual Conference is required, before presenting the name of a nominee, to offer a rationale for why the existing ballot for a particular position is inadequate. The Annual Conference delegates will be asked to vote on whether to accept a new nomination based on the presented rationale. If a majority of delegates vote to approve, the person may then present the name of an additional nominee. If the motion fails, the intended nomination shall not be presented nor named (AC Minutes 2023). If/when a nomination is allowed, biographical information and written consent by the nominee must be submitted to the Annual Conference secretary immediately for publication and distribution (AC Minutes 1979).
- 4. Each year the Nominating Committee explains the goals, needs, and procedures of our election process to the Standing Committee and the delegate body. Delegates are reminded to work towards a balance of age/gender/ethnic representation (AC Minutes 2001) see the Call to Accountability report at www.brethren.org/nominations. Standing Committee's 1983 "Call to Accountability of Representation on Annual Conference Ballots" also authorized Nominating Committee to use atlarge categories in the structure of ballots to correct any imbalances of representation.
- 5. Congregations, districts, and agencies are called to do quality leadership development, giving leadership experience to a wide variety of persons to prepare them for possible denominational leadership, in particular to identify and call forth ethnic/minority leadership. All nominees for denominational leadership are encouraged to have participated in at least one intercultural experience in the past five years (AC Minutes 2001 and 2007).
